HUNGER ISN'T SELECTIVE

The COVID-19 pandemic reminds us that anyone, at any time, in any circumstance, could need a little extra help keeping food on the table. Many Americans, including those in central Pennsylvania, live paycheck-to-paycheck each month and are one bad break away from being in a tough spot.

Meet a few of your neighbors who were brave enough to share their stories of how the coronavirus pandemic has changed their lives.



A sudden job loss ...

Fatima's story was all too familiar - one spouse working while the other stayed home with the kids. But when the coronavirus hit, Fatima was no longer able to continue her job as a care provider for students in schools. And since she was not trained for homecare, her employer laid her off. Now the family of 7 had to find help as their only income was gone and finding the means to purchase healthy, fulfilling foods

became a concern. Thankfully, through a local pop-up food distribution in cooperation with the Food Bank, they have access to the food they need.

"It means a lot to me that I am able to reach out to a facility that will help me in this time of need," says Fatima. "I am very grateful and fortunate that I was able to go there."



Difficulty finding new work ...

In March, Lois and her family moved from Texas to Pennsylvania to be closer to family. When COVID-19 hit, it made getting a new job impossible in a small rural community and they experienced financial hardships. With their savings almost depleted, they connected to a food pantry and have been able to alleviate some of their worries by

PARTNER SPOTLIGHT: NEW HOPE MINISTRIES

So many of our partner agencies had to find a new way to distribute food when the pandemic hit, including New Hope Ministries which provides food to 9,000 families in Cumberland, York and Adams counties. The pantry implemented a drive-through mobile distribution, where families would remain in their vehicles and staff would load food boxes into their trunks.

The pantry is fully stocked thanks to the support of the community, the Central Pennsylvania Food Bank, and to Joanne Fortney, the Food Program Manager at New Hope Ministries, who never works the same day twice. While her job involves anything from driving the truck, loading/offloading food, to doing paperwork, perhaps her favorite thing to do is simply talking with her guests, even from behind a face shield. Joanne intentionally calls the people who rely on New Hope's services 'guests' instead of 'clients,' because she believes volunteers and staff such as herself are inclined to treat someone who is their guest with even

more compassion, empathy, and love.

Joanne is certainly looking out for the guests who are struggling to get back on their feet and she knows it may take some time to fully recover. As the holiday season approaches, Joanne



is already thinking of how to make Thanksgiving extra special. Often, what ends up making holidays like these wonderful for those who cannot afford to celebrate is the generosity of the community. One Thanksgiving miracle, Joanne shares, was the time a donor provided a truckload of turkeys for the people at New Hope as a holiday surprise.

"We were needing turkeys one year," Joanne explains. "And I had no idea where I was going to get (them) — I believe it was somewhere along the line between 50 and 75 turkeys. And I was sitting in our manager's office, and she has a window up front. And down the side of the building comes this pickup truck full of turkeys!"

Like so many of our partners, the doors at New Hope Ministries continue to be open to offer help to those in need. The staff continues to make a difference in the lives of their guests, but, Joanne says, the guests have an impact on the staff as well.

"I think the guests make a difference in our lives," she says. "They change us; keep us humble. I've learned so much from them about life in general. Most of the people would give you the shirt on their back. Not just because you need one, but because they would rather give than receive."

VOLUNTEER SPOTLIGHT: TOM HORVATH

Helping others in the community can be rewarding and fulfilling. For Tom Horvath, volunteering at the Central Pennsylvania Food Bank is this and so much more. As a young boy in the Boy Scouts, he was able to volunteer and serve at the Central Pennsylvania Food Bank. During this time, he found volunteer work to be "a very rewarding thing to do and a good use of my time." It wasn't until about a year and a half ago that Tom found himself back at the Central Pennsylvania Food Bank. "I found I had some extra time on my hands and felt like I needed to do something to help the community out and started looking at a few volunteering programs. Once I saw the Food Bank needed help, and I remembered how much I enjoyed it, I decided to come help out."

In addition to helping those in need, Tom believes his volunteer work has helped him grow as a person. "Volunteering at the Food Bank has made me feel like I have been making some sort of difference out in the world," he says. "During the pandemic, I decided I was going to work at the Central Pennsylvania Food Bank a few nights a week to help as much as I could. I learned a lot from that experience and felt I grew more as a person."

Tom says he was nervous to volunteer at the Central Pennsylvania Food Bank at first. Since he was the new person on the crew, he didn't know what to expect or who he would be working with. "After I started helping on the floor, everyone started to become very personable and made me feel welcomed. This is one of the reasons why I enjoy going back time and time again." Since volunteering at the Central Pennsylvania Food Bank, Tom has been overwhelmed by the support of all the volunteers. "One thing I have always noticed when volunteering is the sense of community there. I always feel

everyone enjoys working together and feels they are making a difference."
